John is a life member of the Brown Hill Cricket Club and Ballarat Cricket Umpires Association. For a number of years, John also coached junior football and currently works the BBQ on Friday nights for winter Auskick and numerous other community events.

John says, "I have been a resident of Brown Hill since the early 1960s, raising a family. I may be a little bit biased but I hope you will forgive me...Brown Hill is the best suburb in Ballarat and I would not wish to live anywhere else."

Joint winner of the Lifetime Achievement Award, Ian Drew, has been involved in Lions Clubs for 48 years, firstly at Wendouree before establishing the Brown Hill Lions Club as Charter president in 1985, where he remains an active member.

Ian led the project to establish a community hall which operates as a meeting place for the club as well as a space where Pinarc Disability Support Services run programs for their clients.

A driving force in the establishment of Inkerman Gully Park in Ballarat North, active in fundraising for the annual 3BA Winter Appeal and in door knocking for the Salvation Army's Red Shield Appeal for many years, Ian is a dedicated volunteer in our community.

Ian says, "These years giving back to the community have been the most rewarding times of my life. Volunteering has become second nature to me and I can't see it changing any time soon." He continues, "This work has fulfilled me and become my passion. Looking back on these 46 years I am humbled but also thankful by the people I have met along the way and the lives that have been enriched. Firstly I felt embarrassed by the nomination. However, now I feel honoured for being recognised for my achievements. Helping others less fortunate than myself has become second nature."

The Ballarat Seniors Awards are coordinated by the City of Ballarat's Ageing Well Services and shine a light on the volunteers in our community who continue to make an invaluable contribution.

Brown Hill Recreation Reserve: Splash Park Update

We are watching carefully the progress on the old pool site.

Site clean-up and soil compaction of the fill have now been completed and the contractors are now ready to begin foundation construction works. The excess soil, (which some locals have named Mt Humffray), will be removed shortly.

We welcome the contractors, Commercial Aquatics Australia, onto the site. They have delivered their site office and facilities room along with a container of tools and some of the initial construction equipment. More of the plant and equipment will arrive over the next month or two as needed.

They have also erected a power pole on the site. Unfortunately, there are hold ups with the provision of the appropriate power needs and City of Ballarat, the contractors and Powercor are working towards getting these issues resolved so real construction work can begin. The City of Ballarat team welcome our patience.

Brown Hill Fire Aware

Summer is fast approaching – are you prepared?

As we know all households need a Bushfire Plan, written and practised. But it is important to remember that just having a plan is not enough. What happens if circumstances change? What if you can't leave? Then a well-prepared property and well-informed family members will offer the best protection. Residents need to be prepared for all scenarios.

Did you know that for a fire to continue to burn it requires oxygen, heat, and fuel? Take away any one of these elements and the fire will go out. We possibly can't do much about oxygen and heat but we can do something about the fuel that feeds a fire. This is why the key thing that residents can do around their homes and blocks is reduce their fuel load.

Take some time to review your written bushfire plan and talk about it with family members. If you live alone, talk with your immediate neighbours and find out what each may be planning to do if a fire is in the vicinity. Remember what you might decide to do may not be possible so always consider alternative actions.

Here is a basic checklist for preparing your property to get you started:

- Review, update and practise your Bushfire Survival Plan;
- Check that trees and shrubs still have space between them (horizontally and vertically) so they don't form a continuous canopy. Prune where needed;
- Remove build-up of fine fuels leaves and twigs (where these build-up will be the most likely places for embers to accumulate);



- Cut back trees overhanging your home. Trim hedges along fence lines;
- Remove dead vegetation from around your home and prune lower limbs of trees. Remove fallen branches and other debris, bark, heavy mulch, wood piles and any other flammable materials close to your home and sheds;
- Check with council to see if a permit is required to burn off garden waste or dispose of material through mulching or at Council's rubbish dump. Look out for dates of Council's free green waste disposal week;
- Ember-proof your home: seal gaps and areas under your home, verandahs or balconies; repair any loose tiles or gaps in your roof; cover windows, crevices and vents with fine wire; repair or fill nooks and crannies where leaves or embers could gather;
- Slash or mow long grass and remove cut material; remove weeds;
- Clear debris/leaves from gutters;
- Check and service all mechanical equipment including grass cutters, water pumps, sprinkler systems and fire extinguishers;
- Check insurance is still adequate;
- Prepare / check your emergency kit;
- Check your fire clothes still fit.

Once your property has had its clean up in the months before summer, remember to take a bit of time in the lead-up to any hot, dry, windy days by double checking around your property. This can make a big difference even if you plan to leave early in the event of a fire in the area. If you know a bad day is coming, here are some easy things you can do to reduce fuel around your home and increase the chances of it surviving:

- Review your plan and know where each family member will be on any days of extreme weather;
- Remove doormats:
- Store away combustible outdoor furniture/kids' toys/other items from decks, around or under the home especially near windows and doors as these are the most vulnerable parts of your home;
- Move pot plants a few metres from the home;
- Mow your lawns;
- Check for any build-up of fine fuels - leaves and twigs;
- Check your gutters, make sure leaves have not built up;
- Make sure trees are healthy with no dead limbs and no vegetation underneath them;
- Make sure you have sealed under the house to stop embers entering.

Remember: Watch the weather! Always be on alert for hot windy days. Did you



know that homes have been lost from things as simple as embers landing on a doormat, creating enough fuel to burn down the front door?

Ballarat Fire Brigade

The Ballarat Fire Brigade is having a busy lead up to the end of the year. On Saturday 9 November, the brigade held an open day to showcase who we are and what we can do. 180 people visited the station.

The event included an antique display of the brigade's 1938 Dodge, a 1985 police car and the old Ballarat Fire Brigade running reel. The brigade was honoured to host Ambulance Victoria and Victoria Police to showcase their vehicles and deliver safety information.

The brigade showcased a rescue demonstration with Ambulance Victoria and also delivered information sessions around fire restrictions and property preparation, to encourage planning.

The Country Fire Authority (CFA) recommends community members know their fire risk, plan and prepare. Whether or not you are in a fire danger area, you should still prepare as embers can travel up to 40km ahead of the fire and could potentially put your property at risk.

If you haven't already, start preparing your property today and keep up maintenance throughout the summer period. Ensure you:

- Cut your grass regularly
- · Clear your gutters
- Prune overhanging trees
- Keep shrubs maintained and short
- Move your wood pile away from the house
- Keep fine fuels to a minimum

On a high fire danger day, to assist in the protection of your property, CFA recommend you remove dog beds, door mats, outdoor furniture and anything else that could trap embers. For more, visit: cfa.vic.gov.au/plan-prepare/how-to-prepare-your-property.

Behind-the-scenes planning is underway for the Urban Ripple project. Suitable local native trees, shrubs, groundcovers and wetland plants have been selected for Ditchfield Reserve and the stretch of Yarrowee River downstream from the freeway. These will be grown by local nurseries over the next six to nine months with the first planting days in autumn or early winter 2025. Weed control contractors will begin spraying and physically removing some of the large woody weeds in the Hearn Road gully at Ditchfield Reserve once the ground dries out

in late spring or early summer.

Soft plastics recycling

Ballarat embraces soft plastics recycling

More than 3,800 households are already diverting 'scrunchable' soft plastics from landfill and recycling them as part of the City of Ballarat's kerbside collection pilot program.

The 12-month kerbside soft plastics pilot enables residents to recycle their soft plastics in a City of Ballarat-supplied orange bag that can now be placed in residents' yellow-lid recycling bin. The orange collection bags are made in Australia from 100 per cent recycled plastic.

As part of plans to develop a longterm circular system for soft plastic packaging waste, the soft plastics that residents recycle will be included in a circular solution to turn them back into quality products or packaging.


Change can be a great thing!

Perridak Burron Early Learning



Springing into our Steps at Perridak Burron

This month has been full of exciting learning opportunities for burron (children), from hands-on experiences with recycling to nature walks and visits to local schools, all helping them explore, engage and connect with the world around them. Recycle Man flew in one day to teach us all about recycling and why it is so important. Our burron were able to share in this experience where they could explore what types of things can be recycled, such as paper, glass and plastic. Recycle Man taught us about the different types of plastics and how to tell them apart by looking at the small triangle found on the label of each item. There was so much excitement with the addition of a role-play as Recycling Superheroes, complete with our own capes as we helped Recycle Man save the day!

This month our Parrwang burron have had the opportunity to venture out on a walk to visit Caledonian Primary School. There they met with teacher Mrs. O'Brien in one of the school's Prep classrooms for a yarn. Mrs. O'Brien engaged our burron in a group activity with the story 'Good Night, Sleep Tight' and discussed different rhymes the children are familiar with. Then there were lots of different games and activities set out for our Parrwang burron to explore in the classroom, as well as so much more outside in the playground and the garden, with the hens and their eggs.

Our littlest burron have been out and about, soaking up the fresh air and learning about caring for country during their sensory walks. Educators have been guiding our Barnong and Yaluk burron as they nature, encountering different plants, observing the sky and connecting with the land by feeling the shifts in temperature and the rhythms of the weather. As we approach the end of the term, our burron continue to grow in curiosity and confidence, embracing every opportunity to learn, connect and contribute to their community and the world around them.

This year was Glen Park Primary School's year of review. An external reviewer inspected our school over two days and helped guide us in developing a new Strategic Plan for 2024-28. Below are observations made after they held forums with parents and students:

Parents were delighted that their children enjoyed going to school. Parents commented on the unique nature of the school whereby the principal/teacher can devote so much one-on-one teaching time to each student.

All students participated in a forum with panel members on the final panel day. Students were positive about the school and the caring and supportive teacher(s).

This year we also completed work in our grounds which included replacing our front fence and access gate and creating a new front garden. We still have some more work to complete in 2025 on our grounds as well as creating much needed additional storage. We will also improve our 'Shelter in Place' facilities.

We have continued our focus on science by inviting a real scientist (Heather) from Swinburne to visit for three special 'science days' focussing on rocks and plants, robotics and forensics. They were so popular we will continue the program next year.

We went on an excursion to see Wicked in Melbourne and an excursion to Werribee Open Range Zoo. We also visited the Art Gallery of Ballarat for our second Aboriginal Arts experience.

Next year we will again be running a tutoring program as well as LOTE, Marc Van visits and Music/Arts therapy as well as our swimming/gym program. Our school library is even bigger than before—the best in Ballarat (have you checked out our Street Library?) and our grounds are looking great.

During the Covid times, we invested heavily with the support of our school council in jazzing up the school. Facilities improvements took time but now we have buildings, grounds and furnishings that are refreshed or new providing a wonderful place to learn.

However, this is pretty obvious. You can see it as you drive by. What is less visible is the huge commitment we have made to up-levelling our instructional approaches, teacher knowledge and learning sequences. While NAPLAN is not the most important thing in our school, it is a allows measure that us to understand how we are performing academically against the state. This year we are starting to see the impact of a significant shift in educational approaches with student achievement above state averages in most areas and, in some, well above state average.

For years now we have been developing our instructional approaches reflect current to research and best practices. This has included explicit teaching, synthetic phonics, structured instruction sequential writing building knowledge from sentence level to paragraph to whole published pieces.

We have implemented daily reviews in mathematics which ensure multiple exposures to key maths concepts over the entire year so new skills are fully practised and embedded in children's understanding. Additionally, we have ensured we continue to use concrete materials to explore maths concepts and find some "fun" in maths lessons.

This benefits our students. The evidence is in. They are learning at an incredible rate and we could not be more proud of them and I could not be more proud of our teachers! This is not the only part of the agenda as the engagement and wellbeing of our students is of paramount importance and this year we feel we have healed from the tough few years we have had.

Our students have been able to engage in a huge range of extracurricular opportunities including camps, sports, arts, excursions, performances and celebrations! While a lesson at the Art Gallery of Ballarat may not be for everyone, our students have all participated with enthusiasm. So, too, a visiting sports clinic in golf may not be for everyone and yet, once again, our students gave it a red-hot go! Over the coming weeks and into 2025 we will see some further improvement outside with basketball court fence being updated, line marking in our car park with an emphasis on safety and a bunch of new air conditioning units being installed which will hopefully reduce our dependence on gas. A big acknowledgement here to our School Council members who, through careful governance and oversight, have allowed us to budget for these improvements!

As we head to the end of 2024, we hope everyone has a fabulous Christmas, a safe and happy New Year and a great January summer break. We will be wishing our Year Six students all the best as they transition to Secondary School and finally, with our newest prep students starting next year, we are excited to see what 2025 will bring!



Wallaby Track parkrun has continued to grow this year. Over winter, we averaged 70 participants and volunteers and this number has increased to 130 during spring. We've welcomed visitors from across Victoria and even Europe, though the majority of our participants come from the local community.

Wallaby Track parkrun achieved this goal, with 163 participants – the second-largest turnout in our history and the largest since Covid. 

The origins of Russell Square date back to 1862. By 1891, an Order declared that the land be permanently reserved for public use and it was gazetted the following year.

Today, recent major upgrades to the space give it AFL Local level compliant female-friendly change rooms, umpires' change rooms, netball change rooms, storage space, landscaping and connections and a veranda. In all, these works at Russell Square have totalled around \$1.4 million and it is utilised by a number of sporting and community groups. Interesting fact – the walking track around the perimeter is exactly 1 km.


